

Comb Honey Basics:

Even with a cool start with spring, summer is right around the corner. The work does not stop with summer this includes: adding supers for comb honey production, managing the hives, and harvesting the crop.

Splits should have been made and packages installed in April, weather conditions may have resulted in a comb honey hives not being as strong as over wintered hives. If this happens there are two easy methods to take advantage of the new queens while boosting her hive strength.

One is to find the queen in the strong overwintered hive. It is not desirable to use an over wintered queen to produce comb honey as it is far mor likely she will lead a swarm than a current year queen. If you can find the queen in a strong over wintered hive, remove her and the frame she is on, plus two or four additional frames with bees. You should take a total of at least three frames, plus one or two more if you judge that the replacement frames will have more brood than the brood than you are taking. In other words, you want the hive with the new queen to have a maximum amount of brood. Put those frames aside.

Then go into the hive with the current year queen and remove an equal amount of frames, being certain that the queen is on one of them. Use these frames to replace the frames you removed from the over wintered hive. No need to do anything special to get the over wintered bees to accept the new queen. The presence of her attendant bees will assure that she will be readily accepted. Then put the frames taken out of the over wintered hive into the hive originally designated for comb honey.

This accomplishes giving the new queen her brood, and attendants the benefit of a much larger number of foragers in the over wintered hive, making the hive stronger.

The disadvantage of this method of producing a stronger hive is that the queen in the over wintered hive must be found, and in late May that can easily take 30 minutes or more. The alternative is to find a hive with a new queen in another yard, close up the hive in the evening and then or the next morning take the closed hive to the location with the strong overwintered hive. Place the strong over wintered hive in a different location of the yard as long as it is over three feet from where it was. Now open the entrance to the comb honey hive and the foragers from the stronger hive will readily enter it therefore doubling the bee population.

Ingredients:

8 ounce baby spinach

16 ounce sliced strawberries

2 cubed avocados

1/3 cup chopped walnuts

1/3 cup crumbled feta cheese

For the Dressing:

1/3 cup balsamic vinegar

1/4 cup honey

2 Tablespoons extra virgin olive oil

Directions:

Toss together the spinach, strawberries, avocados, walnuts, and feta in bowl.

In a separate bowl, whisk the dressing ingredients together.

Drizzle dressing over the greens right before eating.

Makes 6 servings.

If you have any dressing left-over you can store in air-tight container for 3-4 days. Canning jar or glass jar with lid works well.
